1.	<b>Opening, welcome and introductions</b> Cllr Chris Read opened the meeting and welcomed everyone.	
	Apologies were noted as above.	
2.	Notes and actions from the previous meeting and declarations of interestMargaret Oldfield declared an interest in the small grants programme under agenda item 6.The notes of the previous meeting were accepted as a true

	Additional resources for special constables in the town centre Rob Odell informed the RTP that an additional 117 patrol hours were secured over the Christmas period for the town centre, and this additional support will be sustained going forward.	
	<b>Communications update</b> Elena Hodgson has met with theme boards' communications	

	<ul> <li>leads and a mechanism for sharing and promoting good news stories has been agreed. The comms leads are to further investigate the feasibility of a separate hard copy newsletter insert in a local paper.</li> <li>Steve Parry confirmed that SRP will have a communications representative (from SY Police) going forward.</li> <li>Cmmr Kenny commented that a big 'sea change' in how RTP communicates with the public was required.</li> <li>Voluntary Action Rotherham Christmas appeal</li> <li>Margaret Oldfield informed the RTP that there was no shortage of food at any Food in Crisis provider over the Christmas period. In addition, over 1000 donated gifts were distributed across the borough.</li> </ul>	
3.	<ul> <li>Theme board spotlight: Strategic Housing presentation Tom Bell, Assistant Director – Housing and Neighbourhood Services delivered the presentation, which provided a summary of housing priorities and current initiatives, including; <ul> <li>The financial benefits of building good quality, affordable housing </li> <li>The challenge faced in delivering 900 new homes every year </li> <li>The potential for a significant number (1000) of new homes in the town centre </li> <li>Meeting the needs of both an expanding older population and young care leavers by building more specialist housing </li> <li>Ensuring that the correct supporting infrastructure is in place </li> <li>An outline of some of the resources available to deliver new homes, including details of the new SCR Social and Affordable Housing Compact. </li> <li>Questions/comments followed.</li> <li>Azizzum Akhtar commented that more people living in the town centre would be crucial to its regeneration and asked  how many homes were currently located in the town  centre? Tom responded that there were approximately 500  homes in the town centre at present. </li> <li>Julia Bloomer asked if the new town centre homes will be targeted at single people or families. Tom responded that  the aim is to build new, mixed urban communities so the </li> </ul></li></ul>	

aim will be to build a combination of starter homes and	
town houses, and also some specialist housing.	
Adrian Dexter asked if provision will be made for homeless	
and vulnerable people. Tom confirmed that a small pot of	
money is available for a project to engage with rough	
sleepers in the town.	
Cllr Emma Hoddinott commented that anti-social behaviour	
was a key Safer Rotherham Partnership target, and asked	
whether the design for new properties will take ASB into	
consideration. Tom responded that he will be looking to	
engage the best architects and developers to ensure high	
standards are met, and to increase investor confidence to	
make additional schemes viable.	
Rob Odell asked whether the 'Secured by Design' standards	
will be met, and offered the assistance of South Yorkshire	
Polices' trained Architectural Liaison Officers when required.	
Tom confirmed that sites should begin to come forward	
within the next 12-18 months.	
Julie Kitlowski asked that partners should be made fully	
award of future developments, so that the correct	
infrastructure can be put in place to service the needs of the	
new communities (particularly health). Julie asked what is	
meant by 'neighbourhoods' and whether this takes into	
consideration the practice of integrated working – Julie	
asked if partners could agree to consistent language around	
this work. Tom confirmed that in this instance he was	
referring to geographical neighbourhoods.	
Sharon Kemp commented that it looks like there is a lot of	
funding available to deliver new homes, but in reality it isn't	
a great deal – there is a need to create a market so that	
private developers are on board and want to invest.	
Cllr David Roche stressed the need for good architects and	
planners (who are able to transform old buildings and make	
them vibrant) particularly in light of the poor health metrics	
within the town centre. He asked that things such as trim	
trails, green space and separating cars from housing be	
considered as part of any developments.	
Charlotte Scothern informed the RTP that residents in the	
town centre Old Market building were provided with a guide	
of what to do in Rotherham when they moved in.	
Azizzum Akhtar asked what measures would be put in place	
to reassure existing residents that new housing is not only	
for asylum seekers or migrants – would developers have a	

	communications strategy in place to be able to deliver consistent and correct messages to the public? Cllr Chris Read commented that it is important to set a sense	
	of expectation and aspiration, and carefully plan out a communications strategy. Rob Odell asked if pressure on other services had been profiled at this stage. Tom responded that not as yet, because the pace of construction will be modest in the first	
	instance, so there is plenty of time to plan for this and develop key milestones. Sharon Kemp commented that the localities events planned for February and March should allow agencies to get to	
	know our communities better and how they want to live. Tom Bell responded that continual market research is taking place to evidence the housing strategy. Adrian Dexter asked if there was any potential for student	
	housing in the town centre. Tom responded that there was limited demand for student housing, however key worker accommodation was required. Cllr Chris Read thanked Tom for his presentation, and agreed	
	to consider if there were any gaps in RTP membership, given the priorities identified by Theme Boards and the new Rotherham Plan.	
4.	Rotherham Compact sign off Waheed Akhtar (RMBC) and Shafiq Hussain (VAR) introduced the paper which sets out the Rotherham Compact which is a framework for working between the public sector/statutory partners and the VCS. It outlines an approach to partnership working which enables partners to work better together. It contains a reviewed and simplified dispute resolution process. The document has been subject	
	to substantial consultation and has already been through the governance structures of some statutory partners. The Compact will be launched alongside the new Rotherham Plan in March. The next steps include the formation of a Compact leads group, and for the document to be taken through the remaining partner governance processes.	
	Questions/comments followed. Cllr David Roche commented that some of the language used in section 3.1 was quite negative, and asked whether the conflict resolution section needed to be included within the main document, or if it could be appended. Shafiq	

<b></b>	Hussain responded that the Compact is not a legal	
	document, and the conflict resolution could potentially be	
	contained within an appendix.	
	Sharon Kemp informed the RTP that the Compact builds on	
	national standards and is driven in a certain direction.	
	Having the framework is helpful, and the partnership should	
	look to adopt it much wider than at present e.g. by the	
	Business Growth Board.	
	Waheed Akhtar informed the RTP that the conflict	
	resolution process is now reduced from a 5 stage process to 3 stages.	
	Azizzum Akhtar commented that if the language appears	
	negative that's because it reflects some of the experiences	
	of the VCS (in terms of size/scale/power) and a key plank of	
	the document is independence.	
	Nick Bussey commented that the conflict resolution process	
	has not been implemented before as relationships are	
	traditionally strong in Rotherham between the VCS and	
	statutory partners.	
	Shokat Lal stressed the need for partners to work with their	
	employees in order for them to gain an understanding of the	
	Compact.	
	Cllr Emma Hoddinott asked how partners ensure social value	
	when allocating their funding. Shafiq responded that the	
	Compact Leads Group will be looking at this in more detail.	
Noted	The RTP <b>noted</b> the outcome of the consultation.	
Agreed	The RTP <b>agreed</b> to endorse the revised Compact.	
Noted	The RTP <b>noted</b> the establishment of a Compact Leads Group.	
Noted	The RTP <b>noted</b> the arrangements for the formal launch of	
	the Rotherham Compact alongside the new Rotherham Plan	
	on the 29 <sup>th</sup> March.	
5.	Rotherham Plan	
	Michael Holmes introduced the item. The designed	
	document had been circulated to the RTP, with a new title of	
	the 'Rotherham Plan'. The plan will complement the place	
	shaping work and the story book. Michael informed the RTP	
	that the plan was now centred around 5 key game changers.	
	More work is required to refine the milestones and high	
	level indicators which are drawn from theme board	
	priorities to ensure that they are connected. The plan has	
	also been circulated to theme boards for comment, with	
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	some feedback received regarding housing, social value and	
	the incorporation of some of the place shaping language and imagery. The plan will be launched on the 29 <sup>th</sup> March. Michael is looking into the potential for RCAT students to promote elements of the plan via social media. The RTP are asked to forward any comments to Michael before Thursday 2 <sup>nd</sup> February, prior to endorsement by the CEO Group. Questions/comments followed. Cllr Chris Read asked the RTP if the plan was shaping up to look like what people expected. Julia Bloomer asked who was the intended audience for the document? Carole Haywood responded that the Plan is for the community within Rotherham, and is supplemented by the place shaping 'Rotherham story' targeted at engaging with the business community and investors. A number of comments were made around some specific photographs contained within the plan and Michael Holmes confirmed that they would be changed in the final version. Cllr Emma Hoddinott suggested that the 'building stronger	
	communities' work fitted in with the cohesive communities priority under SRP. Cllr Hoddinott offered a review of this by the SRP performance group who could then feedback to SRP and tease out some tangible areas of work under this banner	
	banner. Carole Haywood confirmed that the Rotherham Plan launch would take place at the New York Stadium on the 29 <sup>th</sup> March, 1.00-4.00pm. Save the date invitations have already been sent. The event will also include the launch of the Compact and the place shaping work.	RTP team- Feedback from Launch
6.	<ul> <li>Building Stronger Communities</li> <li>Cllr Chris Read introduced the item and updated the RTP on discussions held on Monday at a meeting with theme board chairs and VCS representatives. Three main ideas were discussed, including: <ul> <li>To prioritise a commitment to bring people together</li> <li>To establish a 'think tank' involving the universities to drive this work forward</li> <li>A small grants programme to help bring people together</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	
	Questions/comments followed. Adrian Dexter commented that faith groups have a role to play in this work, and should look at some collective activity.	

8.	the place shaping work should form the consistent message that partners use to promote Rotherham. Charlotte Scothern informed the RTP that a video had been created by the town centre team for a recent retail conference and could be used more widely to promote the town via partner websites.	
	Carole Haywood informed the RTP that the place shaping work was progressing well, with two themes and one 'big idea' being developed ready for the launch to the business community on the 15 <sup>th</sup> February. A Place Board will be established who will become 'guardians' of the story and an ambassador/champions scheme will be launched. Cmmr Kenny confirmed that this work is complementary to the Rotherham Plan and Compact and will promote Rotherham as a place in order to attract inward investment. Rob Odell commented that he felt that the Partnership was not making the most of positive news stories, and partners should give the media no option but to report positive stories. Jackie Freeborn suggested that partners should be equipped with five or ten key facts about business and the economy. Cllr Read responded that the story that is being created by	Update at the next RTP meeting
7.	Cllr Emma Hoddinott suggested that faith groups could engage more fully in the work that is happening in Eastwood. Azizzum Akhtar confirmed that the Faith Leaders Council had not met for approximately 18 months, although it could be re-established if some co-ordination and infrastructure support was offered. Adrian Dexter agreed to make some initial contact with this group. Sharon Kemp thanked Adrian for this offer. Jackie Freeborn agreed to forward contact details to Carole Haywood for a contact in Doncaster who may be able to assist with this work. Carole Haywood informed the RTP that the criteria for the small grants had yet to be finalised. The fund will consist of £5K funding from RMBC and will be matched by £5K from the RTP core budget. Carole highlighted risks around sustainability of the fund, and the need to measure impacts.
